Thatched roofs

December 2015/January 2016

The following has been reproduced with permission from the Lavenham NFU

In 2014, NFU Mutual paid out an estimated £2.6 million in fire claims for thatched properties and, as part of Chimney Fire Safety Week at the beginning of September, NFU Mutual launched its 'Assets to Ashes' campaign to remind people to take a few precautions before lighting the first fire of the season.

Statistically, homes with thatched roofs are no more likely to catch fire than those with conventional roofs; however, if a thatched roof does ignite, the results are rapid and spectacular, so their owners are well advised to take the following precautions:

- Around 90% of thatch fires are caused by chimneys so make sure you have your chimney swept regularly to prevent a build-up of soot deposits.
- Ensure that the top of the chimney stack is at least five feet above the thatch, allowing sparks to escape and dieout before they settle on the thatch.
- Have your chimney checked to ensure that the brick or stone work is in good condition, especially where it passes through the thatch.
- An insulated lining should be fitted where the stack passes through the thatch.
- · Having your chimney lined is a sensible precaution.
- When installing a stove, make sure you employ a professional with experience of thatched properties to do the job.
- Keep any eye on the flue temperature by fitting a flue thermometer.
- Do not burn wet or unseasoned wood, as this will leave greater deposits in the flue.
- Electrical wires in the roof space should be checked by an electrician at regular intervals and your electricity provider will often conduct a free visual check for you.
- Check your roof for signs of mice or other vermin as they can cause damage to electric wires.
- · Locate smoke alarms and appropriate fire extinguishers throughout the property.
- If contractors are carrying-out work in the roof space, make sure they do not use blow-torches
 or other equipment which could create sparks. Plumbers for example should only use
 compression joints.

For further advice about preventing fire in thatched properties, speak to your local fire safety advisor or Master Thatcher. They will also be able to advise on preventative measures such as the use of Thatchbatts, Barrier Foil and Magma Firestop.

Your local fire officer should carry out a free site visit for thatched properties, as they are keen to know of the whereabouts of every thatched property in their area, especially as thatched properties are often old with poor water supply and access.

Please note in case of fire - call the brigade first. Many roofs could be saved if only they were called 5 minutes earlier!

It is no exaggeration to say that the Tremayne family have blown into our village from all corners of the globe. John came to England from Hobart (population 170,000) the capital city of Tasmania (population 400,000) an island state south of Australia. His own father was born in the UK and worked in Glasgow as a sub editor for one of Robert Maxwell's papers. In search of a new life and presumably less rainfall than Glasgow, he & his wife emigrated to Hobart many years ago where he rose to become deputy editor of The Mercury. They make the long journey to visit the family most years enjoying long stretches of time on their narrow boat which they moor in the UK.


John's mother originally came to the UK from Jamaica to work as a nurse. She was randomly allocated a hospital in Scunthorpe which may sound like getting the short straw but it was where she met John's father when he was working in the same hospital as a student.

John's wife Julia is from Brazil (pop 200 million) which seems to me to be about as far away from Tasmania as is possible to get but they seem to have triatulated their movements by settling in Preston St Mary (pop 177). John and Julia met when they were working in a London bar; they went their separate ways but met by chance a few months later. Winston their mainly Lakeland terrier dog is from an unknown location.

Hobart didn't hold too much excitement for an adventurous 18 year old so John came over to the UK for a gap year and he never went back. Initially he DJ'd and worked in bars but through a friend began working 1 day a week in the kitchen of Salt Yard, Goodge Street, an award-winning bar and restaurant serving modern tapas inspired by the flavours & produce of Spain & Italy. When a full time job became available, he jumped at it and began to learn to cook in earnest. After 18 months he moved from there to become Head Chef at The Gun which is part of the ETM Group where he remained for 3 & a half years. His move to the Six Bells is to fulfil a dream of not only a quieter & better quality of life for the family but also for raising animals - field to fork - for the table and growing vegetables, fruit and herbs for the kitchen. 2 Gloucester Old Spot pigs are arriving on 12th December, chickens will come in the spring, raised beds are being built for the plants but the nanny goat will have to wait until one becomes available. (Does anyone in the village know of a nanny goat for sale?)

It's worth mentioning that other notable people who originated from Tassie are Mary, Crown Princess of Denmark, actors Errol Flynn & Simon Baker, star of The Mentalist, and Richard Flanagan whose Booker prize winning novel The Narrow Road to the Deep North, which our Reading Group devoured earlier this year. I'm sure I can speak for the majority of the village when I say that we are extremely lucky and grateful that Tassie's latest export has decided to put down roots in Preston. The pub has once again become a thriving community hub and the quality of John's cooking, his knowledge, experience and enthusiasm have very quickly gained a well deserved reputation from not just the villagers but rapidly further afield. Let's hope he forgets that he's still on his 'gap year'.

Au revoir to the Keeley family from Down Hall who moved from Preston to Ipswich this autumn. David and Karen became a family while they lived here and were always involved in village life: moving larger items in David's van, using & erecting the marquee for the Great Garden and other events, sitting on committees and in many other helpful ways. I especially remember David running across the fields to help with the house fire at Old Thatches in February 2006 - if we'd ever had a middle distance running race in the village, he would definitely have won.

Nature Notes

According to Heritage Suffolk, Preston means 'homestead of the priests'; it was not until 1957 that our village was renamed Preston St Mary. In 1674 only 23 houses were inhabited. The population recorded in 1086 was 33. 1851 saw the highest number at 386. In 1627 it was noted that there was one villager who was a 'popish recusant'; 17 years later the Rector was accused of being 'popishly affected' by The Suffolk Committee for Scandalous Ministers (please bring this committee back!). In 1066 there was a 'Manor of 2 curucates held by Wulward a free man under

Stigand' (sounds a bit Viking) and 20 years later there was a manor or 2 carucates belonging to Roger of Poitou. Rookwood Lane is not named after the black birds in the surrounding woods as you would think but by an early lord of the sub-manor Maisters, Robert Rookwood, in 1572. It has been recorded that in 1680 only '2 Resident Gentry' ('gents') lived in the village; I would hazard a guess that there are more than that now. In 1550 there were 4 yeomen, 1 carpenter, 1 husbandman, 1 wheelwright and 1 labourer. Only 100 years ago there were 8 farmers, 3 shopkeepers (three!), 4 farm bailiffs, a publican, a miller, a sub postmaster and a teacher. 50 children attended the Sunday School in 1833 and there was a workhouse in 1776 which housed 16 inmates.

Garden birds to spot this winter

There has been a huge increase in the number of wild species coming to gardens to feed according to the British Trust for Ornithology. Their Garden Bird Feeding Survey has seen numbers up almost 50 percent since the 1970s. Two breeds that have seen a significant increase in numbers are the Goldfinch and Blackcap species with bird feeders in the domestic garden thought to be the main reason, and in the case of the Goldfinch particularly, responsible for their over wintering in this country rather than making the perilous annual migratory journey to southern Spain.

Food to put out: oil-rich nyger seed and sunflower hearts

If the blackcap is a bird you associate with a spring dawn chorus or summer's day, then prepare yourself for a surprise. The BTO has reported an increase in this species visiting gardens in winter, in what they describe as a 'remarkable evolutionary event'. Blackcaps tend to be relatively sedentary as the weather gets colder, and favour food like berries and fat. This may partly explain their growing tendency towards gardens. In fact, supplementary feeding, along with a warming climate, is attracting birds from central Europe as our summer migrants fly to Africa for the winter. These birds tend to be quite aggressive at the bird table.

£1,000 Lead Theft Reward!

Following the recent renewed spate of lead thefts in and around Norfolk and Suffolk, including our own Parish Church, the **Eastern Daily Press** is offering a reward of £1,000 to anyone supplying information leading to the conviction of those stealing lead from any church in their readership area.

Church leaders in Norfolk and Suffolk, along with the police and Ecclesiastical Insurance, are urging people to people to be extra vigilant to help keep our region's sacred buildings safe from lead thieves, particularly with the longer dark nights approaching.

We are encouraged to report any suspicious activity to the police, and to note the descriptions and registration numbers of suspicious vehicles, particularly those loitering in the area, oddly driving past several times, and appearing to 'eye up' any remoter access to church premises such as gateways to adjoning fields. And of course to note descriptions of any suspicious people we may see.

Lead thefts have more than doubled year-on-year in the Norwich, Ely and St Edmundsbury & Ipswich Dioceses. In 2013, there were 11 attacks, while last year there were around 25. In the last three months alone, thefts are already well into the teens – including Combs, Stratford St Mary, Hundon, Gestingthorpe, as well as our own sister church at **Lavenham** – and until the thieves are caught it seems they will continue. So we must do what we can to help!

Meeting adjourns for public forum and to receive questions from members of the public Reports from District and County Councillors and Police Officer

Police: No recent crime in the area to report. The Chairman read out a letter from the Chief Constable to all Parish Councils outlining their new policy on attending meetings.

Cllr Arthey BDC – reported that Babergh District Council had opened consultations on its gambling and licensing policies. The electoral registration process was currently under way. The Council had been closely involved following the Sudbury town centre fire, particularly with problems arising from loss of homes and from dangerous structures. The Babergh Community Achievement Awards had been launched with four categories – 'Rising Star', 'Community Hero' Action in the Community & Outstanding Local Business. He noted that under the new glass recycling contract aluminium tops could be left on bottles & jars and would be left on bottles and jars and would be separated and recycled.

Regarding the Swifts Manor Riding Centre proposals Babergh District Council had not received any new input, but when it did the application would be restarted and the Parish Council consulted again. Cllr Arthey reminded councillors that Parish Councils were encouraged to develop emergency plans. He gave an update on possible devolution plans for Norfolk and Suffolk, noting that although proposed structures were not yet clear it was unlikely that greater powers would be granted to Parish Councils.

Cllr Antill SCC reported as follows:

I am sorry not to be with you this evening but I am away on holiday.

Devolution: Suffolk's expression of interest in respect of taking on devolved powers from central government was published in early September and at the time of writing still has to be discussed by Cabinet and full council. This document is the joint production of Suffolk County Council, the Districts and other public sector organisations such as the PCC and the Clinical Commissioning Groups. This is just the opening move in what is likely to be a lengthy process of negotiation with central government. The expression of interest can be seen on the SCC website among the papers for the full council meeting on 16th September.

Finance: During the August break there has been no news about how the County Council proposes to bridge the forecast shortfall in our finances of over £20m in the next two financial years. £20m may be a conservative assessment of the problem since, as was reported in an Audit Committee report last year, central government has little idea about the relative financial strength of individual councils and continues to push more costs onto them. In addition to changes with regard to payment of the living wage, there have also been changes in National Insurance contributions and a number of other impositions. The Local Government Association is becoming increasingly vehement about the necessity for central government to reconsider its approach to the future funding for councils in the autumn statement expected in November.

Other news, mainly about education: August as usual has been a quiet month and the only important other news has been examination results. I think that it is fair to conclude that efforts to improve educational standards in the county are showing signs of working, but progress is not surprisingly slow. Improvements were seen in both GCSE and A level results despite the fact that no overall improvement was seen nationally.

In addition the SAT tests for 11 years olds in the county saw an increase in the percentage of pupils in primary schools achieving the expected level in reading, writing and maths. In 2015 77% of pupils achieved level 4 or higher in the tests compared with 73% last year. The national average stands at 80%, so Suffolk is definitely closing the gap. Suffolk has moved up 22 places in the national rankings, and is now 118th out of 150. There have also been improvements at key stages 1 and 2. The full figures will be published in October.

You Can Leave Your Cap On: The Suffolk Waste Partnership has launched a campaign to encourage residents to recycle the aluminium screw tops from glass bottles such as wine, spirits and cooking ingredients, along with the glass bottles on which they came.

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The 'Leave Your Cap On' campaign aims to increase the recycling of aluminium screw tops and collars by encouraging people to screw the tops back onto the empty glass bottles before taking them to one of the many glass recycling banks located at sites throughout Suffolk.

New vaccination programme launched to protect against meningitis: This month, SCC's Public Health team are welcoming the start of the new vaccination programme that will offer teenagers protection against meningitis (inflammation of the brain) and septicaemia (blood poisoning) caused by four meningococcal strains.

GPs will be inviting all teenagers aged 17 and 18 (born between 01 September 1996 and 31 August 1997) for the vaccine. It's important that anyone who plans to go to university this year gets vaccinated before they leave.

Preston: All has been guiet from Preston over the summer.

Questions from Members of the Public: Questions were raised about trees and hedges overgrowing the road and paths along the Street. The Chairman noted the points and referred to the next point on the agenda.
