



Dear All,

You will all no doubt have heard or seen in the news, the catastrophic earthquake in Italy. Mike Porter (ex resident of Barn Lane) rang me late yesterday afternoon (24th August) to say that it was very close to where they live. He and Charlotte are both OK, but very thoughtfully he rang to let us all know that, although it was very close to them, their property is undamaged; he asked that I let all his friends in PSM know that they are alright.



He was woken during the night with a tremendous noise that he described sounding like a tube train rushing through a tunnel, though much louder, and the house shaking violently. He got up, grabbed his dressing gown, a torch (the power had gone) and collected their dogs before rushing out; he then sat in his car where he was joined by Charlotte. It must have been a terrifying experience for them.

Many of the nearby villages have been decimated and one apparently raised to the ground. A lot of the roadways to these remote mountain villages have also been destroyed, so access for the rescue teams is proving very difficult. He is fearful that many people have died or are tapped under all the rubble; apparently many of the buildings in the centre of these very old, small towns and villages are built of stone with little or no cement, much like dry stone walls, and would not have been able to withstand such a violent earthquake.

He says he is keeping well, as are Charlotte & Christopher, who is in the UK at present visiting his mother who has had a fall and broken her hip. I thanked him for his forethought in ringing and I gave him our very best wishes. We thank God that he and Charlotte are safe.

Blackberry Bomb

If you are picking blackberries from hedgerows this autumn, the recipe below is a delicious way of using them up (imperial measurements - the recipe is very old)

2lb Blackberries
2 Tablespoons water
6oz Broken meringues
8oz Granulated sugar
Half pint single cream
Half pint whipped cream

Cook the blackberries with the sugar and water until the fruit softens. Sieve into a bowl and allow the juice to cool. In a roomy bowl, whip the 'whipped cream' and mix with the cooled fruit juice and the single cream. When thoroughly incorporated, drop in the broken meringue pieces and fold through carefully. Transfer to 2 x 1 pint containers and put in the freezer. When you want to use, transfer the container from the freezer to the fridge about 1 hour before using.

From the archives


10 October 1865, Bury and Norwich Post

DISORDERLY CONDUCT AT PRESTON: Robert Stonhame of Kettlebaston, John East of Lavenham, and Alfred Snell of Preston, labourers, were summoned by Mr Sewell of the Bells Inn, Preston, for refusing to quit his house when requested to do so. The charge was proved by Richard Gage and George Sewell who deposed "On the night of the 19th defendants came into the Bells and began to create a disturbance. The landlord ordered them out, but they refused and offered to fight. The parish constable was sent for to get them out." Stonhame was then charged by the parish constable John King with assaulting him while in the execution of his duty.

19 August 1884, Ipswich Journal

DRUNK ON LICENSED PREMISES: John Mills, thatcher, and William Dyer, labourer, both of Preston, were summoned for being drunk at the Bells Inn, Preston, on the 28^{th} July. John Levett, a labourer, briefly stated the case and Mills pleaded Guilty. Dyer did not appear. Mills was fined 10 shillings and 17 shillings 6 pence costs which were paid, and Dyer fined 5 shillings, and £1 4 shillings costs, with the alternative of 14 days imprisonment with hard labour.

A PUBLICAN AT FAULT: Samuel Cousens, landlord of the Bells Inn, Preston, was also charged with allowing the same defendants to be drunk on his premises. He stated that he was not present at the time, but upon being reminded of his responsibility pleaded guilty. Superintendent Chapman did not press the case and Cousens, being a new tenant, was fined 10 shillings and 15shillings 6 pence costs.

Lavenham Neighbourhood Plan results

Many of you may be aware that our sister village Lavenham have been preparing a Neighbourhood Plan to be used by Babergh District Council to shape future developments within this very special & historic tourist destination. After almost 4 years of consultation & research, Lavenham Parish Council, with its chairman Carroll Reeve at the helm, have produced a very comprehensive Plan focussing on traffic issues and housing for locals, which have always been hot topics for the residents. In 2013, 70% of the village were able to voice their views and helped the Parish Council shape the final plan. Some of you may have heard during September on the BBC, and Radio 4 in particular, what locals' & visitors' views on the village are.

In September residents of Lavenham had a chance to exercise their wishes in a referendum, when they cast their votes. 91% said they were in favour of Babergh District Council using the plan in its decision making process for planning applications in the area.

Mr Reeve has been reported in the Suffolk Free Press as saying "The next stage is that the plan goes before the full council at Babergh on September 20th to be agreed. This means that it will be taken into account as part of Babergh's core strategy"

Attention all metal detectorists ...

"The treasure inquests were held in Bury St Edmunds this week, with the items found ranging from a silvergilt key of Medieval origin to a silver dress hook. All of the items were declared treasure by assistant coroner for Suffolk Nigel Parsley.

The silver-gilt key was found in land near Lavenham by Brian Byford, who was searching with the permission of the landowner Tim Partridge. The British Museum provided evidence for the inquest relating to its age and precious metal content and said it was interested in acquiring the find for its collection.

Mr Byford was not present at the inquest. He made his find on February 16, 2014, and also made another find near Lavenham on December 20 of the same year. That time, he found a silver-gilt strap fitting which Moyse's Hall museum, in Bury, is interested in purchasing.

Further items declared treasure on Monday included a silver-gilt dress hook, found on land near Woodbridge belonging to Sir Michael Bunbury.

Alan Smith found the dress hook on August 1, 2014, after getting permission to go metal detecting by Sir Michael.

Robert Atfield was also given permission by Sir Michael and on October 1, 2014, he found a silver fragment that could date back to Roman times.

The Colchester and Ipswich Museums have expressed an interest in purchasing these items for their collections.

Mr Parsley declared both of the items found in the Woodbridge to be classified as treasure".


